



A very simple little pouch that can be made using leftover skeins and can be made as large or as small as you need. It is knit in the round from the top down and is completely seamless. The given size of the finished pouch, needle sizes and yarn used is for the blue sample. You can use any size needles with any weight of yarn if you follow the formula at the end of the pattern.

**Skill Level** Intermediate

**Needle Size** US size 4 (3.5 mm) DPNs or two circulars whichever you prefer

**Yarn Weight** DK

**Yardage** 60 yards (55 meters)

**Finished size** 6.5 inches wide and 4 inches high when laid flat.

**Other materials needed**

A tapestry needle

Stitch Markers

**Abbreviations**

PM: Place Marker

K: Knit

P: Purl

K2Tog :Knit two stitches together

SKPSSO: Slip one stitch, knit one stitch, pass slipped stitch over knitted stitch.

SM: Slip marker



### Reading the pattern

Stitches between asterisks \*...\* are to be repeated

### Pattern

Cast on 72 stitches. Join in the round without twisting.

Round1 : Knit all around

Round 2: Purl all around

Round 3 – 23 : Knit all around.

Round 24: K12, PM, K12, PM, K24, PM, K12, PM, K12, PM (if you didn't have a marker for the beginning of the round).

Round 25 - 34: \*Knit until the last two stitches before the marker, K2Tog, SM, K12, SM, SKPSSO, Knit to the next marker, SM\* (repeat a second time)

Round 35: \*K2Tog, SM, K12, SM, SKPSSO, SM\*(repeat a second time)

Arrange your stitches on two needles, each needle should have 14 stitches.

Turn your case inside out and bind off using a three needle bind.

### **How to modify the size**

If you would like to make a larger or smaller case, cast on a multiple of 6.

Number of stitches =  $6 \times n$

Work rounds 1 and 2 as above.

Knit for  $n \times 2$  rounds.

Place markers every  $n$  stitches, then knit round 25 as above until you have 1 stitch before your first marker.

Bind off as above.

Example: The pink case was knit in worsted weight yarn on US 6 (4 mm) needles

Cast on 54 stitches =  $6 * 9$

so  $n = 9$ .

Knit until round 18 then started decreasing in round 19, and stopped at round 26 then finished off.
